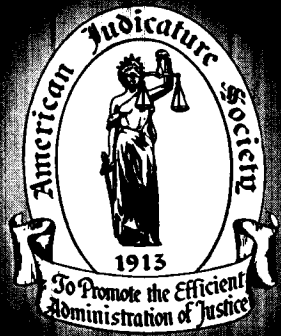

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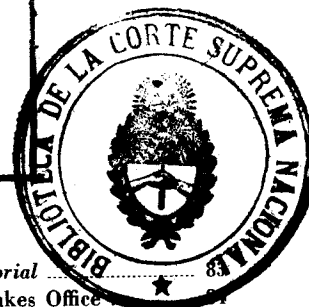
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The Next Administration

MANY people have been concerned about the attitude of the next national administration with respect to federal judicial appointments. We present here the full text of letters written to A.B.A. President John D. Randall by the two candidates, and also the pertinent portions of the two party platforms.

Vice president Nixon's letter to Mr. Randall reads as follows:

"It is a pleasure for me to have this opportunity to express my whole-hearted support for the principles contained in the resolution by the House of Delegates of the American Bar Association on August 25, 1959. I believe it is essential to the most effective operation of our judicial system that the best qualified lawyers and judges available be appointed to judicial office, and I concur also in your recommendation that the number of judges in federal courts from each of the major political parties should be approximately equal. It is particularly gratifying for me to note that the record of the present Administration has been in accord with the standards which have been espoused in your resolution and that the platform adopted by the Republican National Convention in Chicago also endorsed these views."
